CHERYL TRELAND PRESENTATION ON THE HISTORY OF AND CURRENT MANAGEMENT OF THE CHIPPEWA FLOWAGE

In 1912, Cheryl Treland's grandparents, Oluf and Olava Treland homesteaded on the north end of the Chippewa Flowage and started a dairy farm and a logging sawmill. They had seven children. In 1924, the Chippewa Flowage flooded out some of their land but they didn't give up. Fishing camps developed all along the shores and the Treeland Pines was started in 1928.

Cheryl's parents were Oscar (the sixth child) and Denum (Jonnie). After spending most of his career in the Air Force during WWII and the Korean War, he and his wife and their eight children returned to the Chippewa Flowage to operate the family resort, Trelands Cabins. They doubled the size of the resort and put in a lodge and a marina.

Oscar was the last survivor of the original founders of the National Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame, where he was on the board for over 30 years. Both he and his father were active in the Chippewa Flowage Resort Association. He loved to give narrated tours of the Flowage during which he told the passengers of "the sacrifices the Native Americans made in the creation of the Chippewa Flowage". Upon retirement, he sold the resort to two of his children.

In 1923, the "Big Chip" was created as a means to improve the downstream water flow for power generation and flood control. Wisconsin's third-largest lake with a 233-mile shoreline. Excel Energy owns and maintains the dam which creates the Chippewa Flowage. The Lac Courte Oreilles Band of the Lake Superior an electrical Chippewa operates power generation plant at a dam on the Chippewa River near Winter, Wisconsin. The 200 undeveloped islands and shoreline are owned by the state (50%), tribal (30%), National Forest (12%), and privately owned (8%).

In 2000, the Wisconsin DNR, USDA Forest Service, and the LCO formally joined efforts under the guidance of the Chippewa Flowage Joint Agency Management Plan. This plan dedicates the cooperative efforts of these three partners to the long-term management of the flowage to protect the natural features and to provide uniform regulation.

On Wednesday, April 17, 2019, at 7:00 PM at the Stone Lake Town Hall, Cheryl Treland will give a very personal history of the Flowage and discuss the current management of the Flowage. She is an enjoyable presenter and welcomes questions from the audience.

TREASURES, TRASH, & ARTIFACTS

Stephen Lynch was born in Rockford, Illinois and spent most of his summers vacationing at the resort owned by his aunt and uncle in Barnes, Wisconsin. After graduating from high school in Chicago, he enlisted in the Marines in 1964. He was honorably discharged in 1968 after receiving the Vietnam Service and Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medals, Presidential Unit Citation, and Good Conduct Medal. He spent the rest of his career in the telecommunication industry. In May, 1972, he married Catherine West from Hayward and his parents purchased the resort from his aunt and uncle.

Stephen is a very active volunteer in the Hayward area. He serves as chairman of the Sawyer County Veterans Service Committee, is commander of VFW Post 7233, president of the Barnes Area Historical Association, and president of the Hayward Treasures, Trash, & Artifacts Metal Detecting Club. This fall he was honored as Veteran of the Year by the Hayward VFW Post 7233 and the American Legion Post 2818.

The Stone Lake Area Historical Society is a 501 c (3) charitable organization; gifts are tax deductible.

Stephen and members of his metal detecting group will speak about their use of metal detectors to find lost items and locate buried artifacts. This group started on 1986 by Ingwall Hansen and has members from several communities. They work with law enforcement and private individuals to recover objects. They will discuss where and how to search and some of their favorite finds.

This special program will be held on Wednesday, June 19, 2019, at the Stone Lake Town Hall at 7:00 PM. After the presentation, light refreshments will be served.



MUSEUM COLLECTION CONTINUES TO GROW!

The museum complex is closed for the winter but our members and neighbors continue to make donations of important items to our collection. Kitty Quinn Switlick donated the scrapbook of her mother, Rosemary Quinn. It is filled with funeral cards, obituaries, and other interesting Stone Lake articles. Darlene Divicino, a neighbor of Mousie Virnich, spent all of her summers as a child on Big Sissabagama. During that time, she played a much beloved accordion which she donated to the museum this winter.

Kelly Brunner's mother was Lyla Radtke. Lyla and her husband, Augie, loved to dance at the Lion's Hall. Lyla's special dancing shoes are now on exhibit at our museum.

Kelly also donated the 1930's cartoon and embroidery collection belonging to Hildegard Brunner, Don's mother. Hildegard was an artist and seamstress.

Bruce and Maine Dakins donated a radio with vacuum tubes from the B-52 crash. They also donated the mounting bar for the chaff dispenser on the B-52. Chaff was shredded aluminum which was used as a missile deterrent. Both of these items were found at the crash site by Bruce 's grandfather, Leon Coolidge. These were very nice additions to our B-52 display.


